

Investing in solutions: LWF awards \$21,500 in grants

LWF has awarded a total of \$21,500 to three projects as part of our Stewardship, Research and Education Grants Program. Fall 2014 grants will support:

- Caring for our Watersheds: a contest run by Oak Hammock Marsh Interpretive Centre in which high-school students will submit proposals on how they can help their watershed, with a goal of implementing as many projects as possible.
- **Determining extent of plastics pollution in Lake Winnipeg:** a research project undertaken by the University of Manitoba and IISD Experimental Lakes Area Inc. that will survey Lake Winnipeg for microplastics (ie., tiny manufactured beads found in cosmetic products) to help establish a baseline and provide a comparison to other freshwater lakes.
- Making the Case for Wetlands: a short video produced by EKOS Communications that will highlight the benefits of wetlands in relation to issues of water quality, flooding and climate change.

Congratulations to these very worthy recipients!

Our grants program supports projects working to improve water quality in Lake Winnipeg and its watershed. Awarded twice a year, our grants range from \$500 to \$10,000, with priority given to projects that address one or more of the <u>Lake Winnipeg Health Plan</u>'s eight actions to reduce nutrient loading.
